Pool opens for summer with focus on safety

Brookings Municipal Brookings Municipal Pool manager Jimmy Trudeau has a focus on safety and it shows. He has increased the amount of personal personal personal personal personal personal aduatic exercise programs, and improved the lifeguard-to-swimmer ratio in the short few years he has been manager at the pool.

been manager at the pool.

"We prioritize swimming lessons and senior physical therapy here at the pool, because they save lives," said Trudeau.

The pool now holds two sections of private, one-on-one swim les-

two sections of private, one-on-one swim lessons per day in addition to the standard lessons that will be held from 10 a.m. to noon daily. The advantage of the private lessons, according to the pool's head lifeguard, George Kreger, is the attention the swimmer receives from a trained

"It's one-on-on "It's one-on-one instruction with a lifeguard that lasts 45 minutes. That's 15 minutes longer than our standard lessons," he said. "They get more instruction and tend to progress much faster

In addition to the priraddition to the provate lessons being heat 3:45 p.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. The pool will continue to hold standard swimming lessons for youths aged 3-months to 17-years with different stages and groupings depend-ing on the swimmer's skill.

In addition to the various swimming lessons the pool provides, there are several fitness courses, to eral fitness courses, to participate. swimmer-to-lifeguard ratio, a vast improve-ment from years past, when the ratio would reach 30:1 at times. "We have more eyes on the pool," said Trudeau, who institut-ed a system among his staff that allows them to be flexible when the nool gets crowded pool gets crowded. "Each lifeguard is

"Each liteguard is assigned one of three sections. If one section isn't as busy as other sections than those life-guards can also keep an eye on the busier sections."

According to Trudeau, this allows his staff to work together to keep the pool safe and ensures a quick response in the event of an emergency.

A total of 134,312 big game (deer, elk, pronghorn, Rocky Mountain goat, bighorn sheep) tags will be available in the draw, the number and type proposed
